










Welcome Pastor King

We welcome back Pastor Horace King and his wife Marie. This will be the first time Pastor King will be worshipping with us at the Church of the Redeemer. As you may recall, Pastor King is a retired United Methodist (UMC) pastor and the UMC is a full communion partner with the ELCA. The Episcopal Church (TEC) and the UMC are friendly and are negotiating steps to become full communion partners. [Full communion partner means in part, we can exchange clergy and liturgies.) To navigate our denominational differences with some integrity, and since the bridge between TEC and UMC is ELCA, we will be worshipping using Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) and TEC service music and hymns.



As I mentioned in last week's eBlast, the CaSTLE project (Country and Small Town Lived Ecclesiology) is a Lily Foundation Grant focusing on small town and rural church communities, administered through Wartburg Seminary. Scholars at the seminary (Wartburg) note that those of us in mainline denominations have understood being church as "one congregation, one building, one clergy person, with a variety of programs" They call this the Attraction Paradigm. They also observe that rural areas and small towns are aging and losing population. So are our congregations. However, there are portions of rural and small town America that have these characteristics and are also thriving because of the quality of life they offer. Quality of life is dependent upon strong, relational networks; communities that demonstrate concern about the future of the community, and exhibit a deep commitment to the well-being of our places. Congregations are already well equipped to provide quality of life. I believe ours are too.

Wartburg advocates that we move toward a "new" model, a model that will work with our reality. It turns out that this is a model embraced by the early church. Wartburg calls this a "Baptismal Ecclesiology" - in simpler terms: being equipped for and living into our baptismal vows and promises in every aspect of our lives. This might mean doing such things as helping our members identify their spiritual gifts and help them realize that these gifts are evident in their passions, work and volunteer activities. Clergy need to do a better job at explaining that formation does not stop at high school graduation (or confirmation) - it takes place all our lives! Warburg believes that the future of the church is diaconal in nature - witnessing to the church the needs of the world and witnessing to the world the benefits of being church. This doesn't mean we all have to become clergy, it means being empowered to be Jesus' disciples, living and sharing the Good News. In the days ahead, expect my preaching and Bible studies to reflect this shift in models. More next week.


St. John Corner Living into Our Mission @ St. John
